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## An Analysis of Semantic Meaning Found in Ted Talks Instagram Caption

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### Abstract:

Language is a fundamental tool for communication, serving as the cornerstone of everyday interactions. It encompasses various forms, including spoken and written language, and is expressed through words, phrases, clauses, sentences, and paragraphs. This diversity in language reflects the rich tapestry of human cultures. The study of linguistics is essential for understanding and developing language skills, with key areas including phonology, morphology, semantics, and syntax. Among these, semantics plays a crucial role by focusing on the meanings conveyed through both speech and writing, which is vital for effective communication.

In the field of semantics, Leech (1974) defines meaning as the concept or thought that is transferred from a speaker to a listener through language. This concept is particularly relevant in the context of modern social media platforms such as Instagram. Instagram, a widely used social media platform, facilitates communication through visual elements like photos and videos, accompanied by captions. Users actively engage with content by leaving comments, which can vary from supportive to critical.

This study applies Leech's theory of the seven types of meaning—conceptual, connotative, social, affective, reflective, collocative, and thematic—to analyze Instagram captions. Given Instagram's widespread popularity, especially among college students, the platform's features allow for succinct sharing of messages, making it an effective medium for exchanging meanings. Captions on Instagram provide additional context, express emotions, and convey situational information through different moods and illocutionary acts.

The descriptive qualitative study, titled "Analysis of Semantic Meanings Found in TED Talks Instagram Captions," investigates these semantic elements in the context of Instagram captions. By exploring how meanings are constructed and communicated on this social media platform, the study aims to enhance our understanding of language use in digital communication and its impact on the way messages are conveyed and interpreted online.

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### Introduction

Language is undeniably the foremost and most significant tool for communication, serving as the foundation for all human interactions. As highlighted by Bloomfield (1993), the study of language is crucial in our daily lives (Kamanda Sari, 2023). (Swarniti, 2019) emphasizes that language encompasses a wide range of forms, including spoken and written words, phrases, clauses, sentences, and paragraphs (Kamanda Sari, 2023). These linguistic elements serve as reflections of distinct human cultures and are integral to understanding human communication. Linguistics, the scientific study of language, plays a pivotal role in the evolution and development of language. According to Umagandhi (Umagandhi et al., 2017) linguistics is divided into four key branches—phonology, morphology, semantics, and syntax—each contributing uniquely to language development (Kamanda Sari, 2023). Among these, semantics focuses on understanding the meaning conveyed through both spoken and

written communication. Leech (1974) defines meaning as the concept or thought transmitted from the speaker's mind to the listener's mind through language (Kamanda Sari, 2023).

Social media has become an integral part of modern life, with Instagram being one of the most popular platforms. Rainie, Brenner, and Purcell (2012) highlight that photos and videos have become primary forms of online social currency. Shafie, Yaacob, & Singh (2016) note that Instagram is particularly popular among college students, providing a platform for concise message sharing and meaning exchange. Captions on Instagram, which are short sentences accompanying photos, play a crucial role in this exchange. (Fauziyah & Nurjannah, 2019) observe that captions often provide context, express emotions, or convey situational information Amirudin and Triyono (2018). These captions utilize various moods and illocutionary acts to fulfill different speech functions, making them a significant area of study.

This research, titled "Analysis of Semantic Meanings Found in TED Talks Instagram Captions," employs a descriptive qualitative research method to investigate the semantic elements embedded within TED Talks Instagram captions. Semantics, as a crucial subfield of linguistics, delves into the meanings of words, phrases, and sentences, focusing on the conventional and shared meanings rather than individual or subjective interpretations (Yule, 2015). This research approach emphasizes an objective understanding of language, aiming to elucidate how meaning is constructed and communicated through standardized language elements, while intentionally excluding specialized or localized meanings that might arise in specific contexts.

The primary objective of this study is to illuminate the importance of semantic comprehension in facilitating effective and nuanced communication. By examining how TED Talks Instagram captions employ semantic meaning, this research aims to provide insights into how such captions can enhance message conveyance on social media platforms. Understanding these semantic elements is essential for appreciating how captions contribute to the overall impact and clarity of communication, especially in the concise and visually-driven context of Instagram.

(Sugimoto et al., 2013) TED, a non-profit organization founded by Richard Saul Wurman in 1984, has become a significant digital media platform known for sharing "ideas worth spreading" (Alnasser, 2023). The TED conference, which began in Los Angeles and later moved to Vancouver in 2014, features speakers from diverse fields such as science, philosophy, music, business, and religion, presenting innovative ideas to a global audience. (Gallo, 2014; Alnasser, 2023). This study will focus specifically on the semantic meanings in TED Talks Instagram captions, examining how these meanings contribute to effective communication and message conveyance on social media. The conference became an annual event in Los Angeles, California, by 1990, and later moved to Vancouver, Canada, in 2014 (Gallo, 2014). TED speakers come from various fields such as science, philosophy, music, business, and religion, aiming to present motivational and innovative ideas to highlight their importance to the audience. TED talks cover a range of topics including technology, humanities, business, and science (Alnasser, 2023).

This study will specifically focus on the semantic meanings present in TED Talks Instagram captions. It will explore how these captions use semantic principles to enhance communication and convey messages effectively in the digital age. By analyzing the semantic strategies employed in these captions, the research seeks to provide a deeper understanding of how language functions in social media contexts, particularly in relation to conveying complex ideas and emotions succinctly. The findings from this study aim to contribute valuable insights into the role of semantics in modern communication practices and its implications for message effectiveness on platforms like Instagram.

## Method

### 1. Definition of Semantics

Semantics is fundamentally concerned with the relationship between linguistic expressions and their referents. While a general consensus exists that semantics links words to their meanings, there is considerable debate about the nature of these meanings and their representation. Different perspectives exist regarding whether referents are tangible real-world objects, abstract entities that do not exist in the physical world, or mental constructs that may or may not align with reality.

To provide a clearer understanding of semantics, it is useful to explore two primary traditions: the realistic approach and the cognitivistic approach.

#### a. The Realistic Approach

The realistic approach to semantics posits that the meaning of a word or expression exists independently of the individuals using it and resides in the external world. This approach can be further categorized into two distinct types

1) **Extensional Semantics:** This perspective associates the components of a language with a conceptual "world," whether the language is formally defined or not. In extensional semantics, names are mapped to specific objects, predicates are linked to sets of objects or relationships among them, and sentences are related to truth conditions within the language. This approach maintains that the meaning of an expression is independent of the individual understanding of the user. It originated with the work of Frege and was subsequently developed and refined in Tarski's theory of truth (Gärdenfors, 2017).

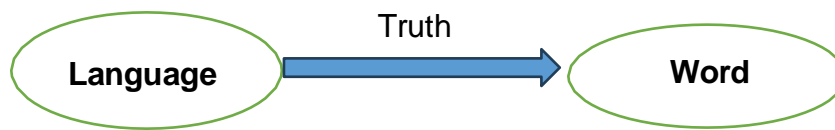
2) **Intensional Semantics:** Although not detailed in the provided text, it is important to note that intensional semantics focuses on the meaning of expressions in terms of their potential to refer to different objects or situations. It involves understanding the meaning of expressions by considering various possible worlds or scenarios in which they might be true. This approach emphasizes the internal, cognitive aspects of meaning, distinguishing it from the more externally-focused extensional semantics.

#### 3) The Cognitivist Approach

The cognitivist approach to semantics, in contrast to the realistic approach, emphasizes the mental and cognitive aspects of meaning. According to this perspective, meanings are seen as mental constructs or cognitive representations rather than as independent entities in the external world. This approach focuses on how individuals mentally process and interpret linguistic expressions based on their experiences and knowledge.

By exploring these traditions, one gains a deeper appreciation of the various ways in which semantics can be understood and applied. While the realistic approach highlights the objective nature of meaning in relation to the external world, the cognitivist approach emphasizes the subjective and cognitive dimensions of linguistic interpretation.

The extensional theory of reference, upon which this semantics is based, was quickly deemed insufficient due to several phenomena observed in natural languages. To tackle these challenges, logicians and linguists introduced what is called intensional semantics. In this framework, the language *L* is associated with not just a single world, but a set of possible worlds. Despite this adjustment, the goal of semantics remains to furnish truth conditions for sentences in *L*. In this context, the meaning of a sentence is seen as a proposition, equated with the set of possible worlds where the sentence holds true. The classic form of this semantics is Kripke's (1959) semantics for modal logics. In the context of natural languages, intensional semantics reaches its pinnacle in Montague's (1974) work.

## 2. Definition of Meaning

While every definition of meaning is an imperfect attempt to capture the essence of a concept, often leaving gaps to be filled, Palmer's (1981) definition of meaning as a concept or idea conveyed from speaker to listener through language or other forms is particularly criticized for being too vague and general to sufficiently underpin the traditional conceptualist theory of meaning. This criticism is rooted in the observation that Palmer's definition fails to provide a clear and distinct boundary between what constitutes meaningful communication and what does not.

Furthermore, critics argue that Palmer's definition relies too heavily on the notion of intentionality, which can be problematic as it assumes that speakers and listeners share a common understanding of the intended meaning behind the message. This assumption may not always hold true, particularly in cases where cultural, linguistic, or social contexts can significantly influence the way messages are interpreted. Moreover, Palmer's definition does not account for the complex dynamics of communication, including factors such as tone, context, and audience reception, which can greatly impact the way messages are perceived and understood.

As a result, some scholars argue that a more nuanced and context-sensitive approach to understanding meaning is needed, one that acknowledges the complexity and multifaceted nature of language and communication. By recognizing the limitations of Palmer's definition and exploring alternative approaches to understanding meaning, researchers can move towards a more comprehensive theory of meaning that better captures the richness and diversity of human communication.

## 3. Types of Meaning

Geoffrey Leech has identified the definition of "meaning" as a significant weakness in language studies, acknowledging that it is an elusive concept that has yet to be fully grasped. He suggests that the advancement of scientific knowledge will ultimately shed more light on the concept of meaning, thereby enabling a more precise and contextualized understanding. However, this raises questions about the nature of meaning itself: is it inherently subjective or objective? Is it tied to the individual or shared across cultures? Leech's assertion implies that meaning is an evolving concept, shaped by ongoing scientific discoveries and our collective understanding of the world.

According to Leech (1981, p. 9), classifying meaning into 7 types is advantageous because these categories provide a comprehensive summary of overall meaning. (Pardianti et al., 2022).

- a. Conceptual meaning, also referred to as denotative or cognitive meaning, involves a highly complex and sophisticated organization. It is based on two main structural principles: contrastive structure and constituent structure.
- b. Connotative meaning encompasses the expressive value of a phrase that goes beyond its mere conceptual content. It includes additional properties, whether physical, psychological, or social, and can refer to any characteristics of the referent.
- c. Collocative meaning arises from the associations a word forms due to the meanings of words that commonly appear in its context. It is shaped by the frequent co-occurrence of words in particular environments.
- d. Affective meaning conveys the speaker's emotions, including their attitude towards the listener or the topic being discussed. This type of meaning often clearly emerges through the conceptual or connotative content of the words chosen.
- e. Social meaning refers to the information conveyed about the social context of its users, providing insight into the intricate dynamics of speaker-listener interaction. It reveals subtle aspects of their social relationship, such as everyday language, familial terms, and other indices of their interaction. By examining social meaning, researchers can gain a deeper understanding of how language is shaped by and reflects the social environment in which it is used.
- f. Reflected meaning occurs when a word carries multiple conceptual meanings due to the presence of multiple concepts within it. This meaning emerges from our reaction to one sense of a word being influenced by another.
- g. Thematic meaning is conveyed by the way the speaker or writer arranges the message, highlighting emphasis and focus through the order of presentation.

#### 4. Definition of Caption Instagram

A caption is a short description accompanying pictures, photos, or videos posted on Instagram (Alfiyatun, 2018). Instagram captions can be up to 2,200 characters long, which is roughly 330 words. Maharani (2017) highlighted that in addition to using Instagram captions in the learning process for writing recount texts, students should focus on the writing process itself, as it is essential for effective writing. Therefore, teachers need suitable strategies or approaches to help students improve their writing skills. One such strategy is the process approach. (Avivi & Megawati, 2020).

### Results and discussions

According to Leech (1981, p. 9), classifying meaning into 7 types is advantageous because these categories provide a comprehensive summary of overall meaning. (Pardianti et al., 2022). Conceptual Meaning; Connotative Meaning; Collocative Meaning; Affective Meaning; Social Meaning; Reflected Meaning; Thematic Meaning

This perspective on art as a means of self-expression and connection encompasses a range of emotions, from the melancholy that arises from separation and intimacy at dinner to the existential quest for understanding. The emotional significance of self-disclosure and self-awareness, combined with the social relevance of the TED Talks platform, underscores the central theme that personal experiences can serve as a catalyst for self-discovery and interpersonal connection. By sharing their stories and insights, individuals can tap into a shared human experience, fostering empathy, understanding, and community.

Research on the semantic meaning in the caption of Wan Faridah Akmal Jusoh's TED Talk about fireflies shows the importance of making efforts to preserve the environment. Fireflies are imaged as insects that emit light, which are considered to have beauty and fragility, and have their own uniqueness. The emotional connotations of efforts to protect them and the social involvement of Wan Faridah's role as an entomologist reflect her commitment to sustainability efforts. The main theme focuses on the importance of preserving firefly habitats to maintain natural cycles.

Research on the issue of sexual discomfort during menopause, as discussed by Maria Sophocles, reveals the existence of medical misunderstandings and biases that lead to "discrepancies in the bedroom." Conceptual understanding of children, related topics, as well as the role of educators, as well as the challenges and obstacles in avoiding such discussions, underscores the importance of educating students about issues surrounding racism. The connection with practical teaching aids and emotional meaning in dealing with dilemmatic problems reflects the application of practical and applicable teaching methods. The theme emphasizes the importance of discussing relevant topics with children and provides props for meaningful and respectful discussions.

This study underscores the significance of examining semantic meaning in communication to convey effective and impactful messages. As Leech (1981), ptly notes, establishing meaning is a vital link between speakers and listeners, facilitating a deeper understanding and connection between them (Kamanda Sari, 2023). This research highlights the importance of considering various connotations, collocations, and contexts in analyzing texts, as these linguistic features can significantly broaden our comprehension and appreciation of complex ideas. By examining the nuances of language, we can gain a richer understanding of the messages being conveyed, ultimately enhancing our ability to communicate effectively and meaningfully.
